And with our comprehensive Downtown Activation Plan, we are building on that momentum to make this vital neighborhood a safe, welcoming place for residents, workers, and visitors alike. But more than just short-term solutions, our plan also looks at visionary ideas – or "Space Needle Thinking" – to create a world-class urban hub for future generations.



Initiatives to improve public safety and address homelessness by bringing people inside underscore all of our efforts to move Seattle forward in a new direction. This includes addressing the deadly fentanyl epidemic with urgent, compassionate action through a dual public health and public safety approach; passing a historic housing levy that will result in 3,000 new units of affordable housing and tools to prevent homelessness; and launching a third public safety department to ensure people in crisis receive the care they need.

But above all else, we worked to increase trust and restore confidence in local government's ability to serve our residents. For a second year, our One Seattle Day of Service brought out thousands of volunteers who want to make our city a better place and be part of this new direction we are headed in.

While there is a lot of great progress to celebrate, there is still more work ahead. I remain committed to improving long-term public safety so every community can live free of fear; helping people in need access housing, treatment, and supportive services so they can lead healthy lives; creating an equitable and vibrant economy that uplifts small businesses, entrepreneurs, and workers; and building a sustainable, climate-forward future for our youth and entire city.

With our *One Seattle* vision as our North Star that guides everything we do, I know we can build the safe, equitable, and thriving city we all want to see, and I look forward to continuing that work for you in 2024.

Working Together to Build *One Seattle*

Progress on Public Safety

Mayor Harrell has made public safety the City's top priority, which starts with ensuring Seattle has the right number of police officers, the right solutions, and a clear system of accountability. In 2023, we put a focus on police recruitment, addressing rising gun violence and drug use, and rebuilding public trust.

- Mayor Harrell acted to <u>address the rise in gun</u> <u>violence</u> by combining enforcement, community solutions, and tools like <u>a Crime Prevention Program Pilot</u> which will use new technologies to protect neighborhoods impacted by recurring gun violence and collect new evidence to solve crimes.
- The City <u>negotiated a new labor agreement with the Seattle Police Management Association</u>, creating an enhanced system to address disciplinary appeals and taking other critical steps to strengthen accountability processes and improve public safety.
- The Seattle Police Department (SPD) continued to make progress on improving recruitment and retention, with resignations down 39% compared to 2022 and hiring up 11%, with an average of nearly 200 applicants per month by the end of 2023.
- SPD <u>achieved sustained compliance</u> with the 2012 federal consent decree, as we work toward our goal of a police service that is fair, respectful, and effective.

- Mayor Harrell led local efforts to reduce the harmful impact of public drug consumption, <u>issuing an Executive Order</u> making clear that while diversion is the preferred response, drug use that threatens others cannot be allowed to continue unchecked.
- SPD implemented <u>the nation's first policy governing</u> <u>the use of police patrol ruses</u> to ensure that this tactic is only used in specific situations to support public safety, with clear requirements for documentation, supervisor approval, and protections for juveniles.

Comprehensive Public Safety

Mayor Harrell's comprehensive approach to public safety means ensuring we have the right people for the right task, which means scaling up diverse response options. In 2023, Mayor Harrell launched Seattle's third public safety department, took action to address the drug crisis, and expanded existing teams who have proven successful.

- Mayor Harrell launched the new Community

 Assisted Response and Engagement (CARE)

 department which includes the 9-1-1 Center and behavioral health specialists who are providing care to people experiencing mental and behavioral health crises as part of a Dual Dispatch Pilot.
- Seattle Parks and Recreation hired <u>12 park rangers</u> to <u>keep Seattle's parks open and accessible</u>.
- Mayor Harrell issued an <u>Executive Order</u> to advance public health solutions to the fentanyl crisis, launch the <u>new Health 99 overdose response team</u>, and increase access to and investments in drug treatment facilities and services.
- The City worked with impacted communities to <u>create</u> <u>new systems</u> ensuring immigrant and refugee families receive culturally responsive support after a crime.

- The City announced a <u>new labor agreement with</u> <u>International Association of Fire Fighters, Local 27</u>, which reflects the City's commitment to attracting and retaining these highly skilled workers with additional pay, benefits, and an innovative approach to ensure more consistent increases and minimize dramatic inflation swings.
- Mayor Harrell joined over 30 mayors from across the country in <u>calling on congressional leaders to fund critical resources</u> to address the nationwide fentanyl and synthetic opioid crisis, because the scale of this crisis cannot be solved by cities alone.

Housing and Homelessness

Urgency and compassion are at the root of Mayor Harrell's actions to bring people indoors and ensure City streets, sidewalks, and public spaces are open to all. Homelessness is inherently linked to housing access, and the City is taking deliberate, meaningful steps to increase affordable housing.

- Mayor Harrell's <u>2023 budget</u> included the largest single-year investment in affordable housing in the City's history \$339 million toward increasing the supply of affordable homes throughout Seattle.
- The City advanced efforts for new housing to be built faster, through new legislation to streamline the design review process and increase production of affordable housing.
- Mayor Harrell's \$970M Housing Levy proposal was overwhelmingly passed by voters, an historic investment that will create 3,000 new affordable homes, stabilize the supportive housing workforce, and provide direct assistance over the next seven years.
- The City's Unified Care Team launched five Neighborhood Teams to <u>lead encampment response</u> <u>across the city</u>, bring tailored solutions to each community, and help those living unsheltered come inside.

- The City invested \$109 Million to support shelter resources, rapid rehousing, outreach and housing programs through the <u>King County Regional</u> Homelessness Authority.
- Mayor Harrell worked with City Council to pass a wage equity investment representing a cumulative 9.5% increase in pay for human service workers who serve our most vulnerable neighbors, including homelessness outreach providers and permanent supportive housing staff.
- The City advanced an improved Fort Lawton Redevelopment Plan that will include up to 500 units for rental, homeownership, and permanent supportive housing in the Magnolia neighborhood.

Revitalizing Downtown

Mayor Harrell announced Seattle's comprehensive <u>Downtown Activation Plan</u> (DAP) – a bold and ambitious roadmap to revitalize and transform Downtown Seattle now and for the future. Through the DAP, the city is fostering a more vibrant, inclusive, and resilient hub for residents, workers, and visitors.

- Mayor Harrell <u>signed a slate of legislation</u> to support residential development, promote street use activations by waiving fees and permit costs, strengthen public-private partnerships with businesses and organizations, and fund spaces at King Steet Station for five arts non-profits.
- The City <u>renewed and expanded the Metropolitan Improvement District</u> (MID) to expand cleaning, beautification, safety, and hospitality services, art installations, events, activations, economic development support, transportation services, and security downtown.
- Seattle received a \$45 million philanthropic contribution to launch Elliott Bay Connections, a new public-private partnership to create a greenway for pedestrians and cyclists, and enhance Myrtle Edwards Park and Centennial Park with new children play areas, beach access, lighting, and restrooms.

- The City hosted the <u>Seattle Slam Showdown</u> youth basketball tournament and Pickleball for All tournament, bringing people, sports, and excitement downtown.
- <u>City Hall Park on 3rd Ave was reopened</u>, activating the iconic park with ongoing activities that draw people downtown and provide a safe, vibrant, healthy space for neighbors, workers, and visitors.
- Mayor Harrell signed <u>Seattle Tourism Improvement</u> <u>Area (STIA) legislation</u>, establishing a new 15-year Business Improvement Area to increase travel and tourism promotion for the city and region.
- Summer 2023 welcomed 11 million visitors downtown and the highest number of hotel rooms sold since 2019.

Arts, Culture, and Events

Seattle's strong artistic culture is woven into the fabric of our city, neighborhoods, and communities. Through investments and partnerships, Mayor Harrell expanded economic opportunities for creative entrepreneurs, beautified the city through murals and public art, and filled neighborhoods with events for residents and visitors alike.

- Seattle welcomed tens of thousands baseball fans from around the world for the Major League Baseball All Star Week to enjoy events while exploring the city and stimulating the local economy.
- Iconic events returned to Seattle including The Bite of Seattle, Bumbershoot, Seafair Weekend Festival, Torchlight Parade, and Capitol Hill Block Party.
- Seattle Center became the number one arts and cultural destination in the city and state and top ten in the country with events like the Holi Festival of Colors, Blastfest Afro-Beats Music Festival, and the Seattle German Town Christmas Market.
- \$1M was invested into the <u>Hope Corps</u> program supporting arts and artists downtown, and a partnership with Uplift Northwest abated graffiti across the CID and Downtown

- Mayor Harrell recognized Virginia Bogert as the <u>2023</u> <u>recipient of the Mayor's Film Award</u> for Outstanding Achievement during the Seattle International Film Festival.
- <u>The City awarded \$13.5M</u> through the <u>Equitable</u> <u>Development Initiative</u> to support site acquisition, property ownership, major capital projects, and capacity-building for cultural organizations.
- Marshall Foster was appointed <u>Director of the</u>
 <u>Seattle Center</u> and Gülgün Kayim <u>Director of the Office</u> <u>of Arts & Culture</u>.
- The City celebrated the <u>50th anniversary of the 1% for</u> <u>Public Art program</u>, one of the first ordinances in the nation established for ongoing investment in public art.

Investing in Community

Mayor Harrell's vision for *One Seattle* is an inclusive, welcoming city where every resident has the resources to reach their full potential. This vision is rooted in vibrant communities where everyone can access good jobs, education, and City support.

- Mayor Harrell announced the <u>expansion of the Seattle Preschool Program</u> to 89 sites citywide, including 28 dual language classrooms. The program <u>won national recognition</u> for the second year in a row.
- Strengthening protections for industrial lands and planning for future growth, the City passed <u>an innovative Industrial and Maritime Strategy</u> that was unanimously approved and <u>signed into law</u>.
- To ensure every child and family has access to affordable swim lessons, Mayor Harrell <u>celebrated the launch of Swim Seattle</u>, a pilot program to eradicate disproportionate drownings among youth of color.
- Joined by students and education partners, Mayor Harrell launched the <u>Reach Out Seattle</u>, a new initiative focused on prevention and early intervention of youth mental and behavioral health challenges.
- Mayor Harrell announced the <u>expansion of the</u>
 <u>Affordable Seattle initiative</u> and portal where residents can easily apply to multiple City discount programs, with up to \$23,000 in potential savings per family.

- In partnership with Tabor 100, the University of Washington, and Seattle University, Mayor Harrell launched the Liberty Project, a new business growth program to expand opportunity for businesses owned by underrepresented communities in Seattle.
- Building on efforts to grow pathways to generational wealth, Mayor Harrell <u>signed a new Executive Order</u> that expands contracting equity and access for women and minority-owned businesses seeking contracting and procurement opportunities with the City.

Reducing Our Emissions

Mayor Harrell knows we need bold action to combat the climate crisis and build community resilience. We advanced a wide array of initiatives to build a climate-forward future for Seattle, reducing emissions from existing large buildings and accelerating transportation electrification to create low pollution neighborhoods.

- In one of the most ambitious efforts to reduce the city's greenhouse gas emissions, Mayor Harrell proposed a new Building Emissions Performance

 Standard (BEPS) policy to reduce emissions from large buildings by 27% by 2050.
- Seattle received \$25 million in federal funds to help ensure people especially those walking, rolling, and biking can travel safely by investing in historically underserved neighborhoods, as well as an additional \$1 million to plan for low-pollution neighborhoods that will reduce transportation emissions.
- To improve air quality and health outcomes in Portadjacent communities, the City <u>launched an Electric Trucks pilot program</u> to support local truck drivers' transition to electric freight vehicles.

- The City received <u>a \$4 million grant</u> from the Environmental Protection Agency to develop a new salvaged wood warehouse to store, organize, and distribute salvaged wood which is expected to process 150 tons of wood each year.
- Seattle held its first ever <u>Youth Transportation</u>
 <u>Summit</u> to center young people's voices as we plan for transportation solutions that reduce emissions while making travel safer and more affordable.
- Mayor Harrell announced a new directive to <u>phase</u> <u>out the use of gas-powered leaf blowers</u> by City departments and replace them with carbon-neutral options that are safer for operators.
- The City partnered with the Seattle Housing Authority to expand access to affordable transit with free ORCA cards for 10,000 residents, building on the statewide effort expanding free transit to riders 18 and younger.

Greening the Emerald City

Seattle's tree canopy and urban forest are critical to our health and quality of life. To mitigate the impacts of climate change and build healthy communities, Mayor Harrell has advanced efforts to protect existing tree canopy and address inequities in canopy distribution impacting historically underserved neighborhoods while also securing new critical investments to plant the next generation of Seattle's urban forest.

- To reverse recent declines in canopy coverage, Mayor Harrell <u>issued an Executive Order and advanced new legislation</u> with Councilmember Dan Strauss to support and grow Seattle's tree canopy. The legislation strengthens the City's Tree Ordinance to safeguard 157,000 more trees and the Executive Order requires three trees be planted for every tree removed on City-owned land.
- In a major boost for community tree planting efforts to combat extreme heat and climate change, Seattle received a \$12.9 million grant from the U.S. Forest Service to plant and maintain trees and support pathways to green careers for young people.
- Seattle was <u>selected as a "Role Model City"</u> for the United Nations Environment Program's Generation Restoration initiative. As a role model city, Seattle will highlight urban forest restoration efforts and initiatives to preserve natural areas and enhance ecosystem health throughout nearly 500 parks.

- Mayor Harrell's <u>budget proposal</u> expanded the Trees for Neighborhoods program to plant 1,300 trees next year and included funding to explore siting a One Seattle Tree Nursery to grow trees locally.
- Joining the Japanese Consul General, Mayor Harrell celebrated the <u>planting of eight new cherry blossom trees</u> and installation of a commemorative plaque honoring Japanese history as part of the Pike Pine Streetscape and Bicycle Improvement Project. <u>Sixteen other cherry blossom trees</u> will be planted around the city, replacing ones that were in decline.

Caring for Our Community

Mayor Harrell's vision for *One Seattle* centers caring for community and neighbors helping neighbors. Seattle stepped up big in 2023, from employees acting to support emergencies around the country to community donations for global crises and volunteer cleanups close to home, we made a difference to those in need.

- The second One Seattle Day of Service was held on May 20 with nearly 4,000 volunteers taking part in a wide array of service opportunities including cleaning and beautification, gardening and restoration, and helping neighbors in need.
- Over 16,000 community members participated in over 2,000 Adopt a Street events, cleaning over 1,700 miles of streets and collecting over 180,000 lbs of trash; volunteers also cleared nearly 4,000 lbs of debris to keep storm drains clear and help prevent flooding.
- The <u>Seattle/King County Clinic</u> provided 3,066 people with free dental, vision, and medical care <u>valued at</u> \$2.6 million. Since the Clinic's inception in 2014, 27,000 volunteers have saved the same number of patients more than \$23 million in out-of-pocket costs through services provided free of charge at the Clinic.



- City workers took action to support people impacted by the catastrophic wildfires in Maui, with employees donating \$44,056 to recovery efforts and the Fire Department deploying 21 staff to assist with search and rescue efforts.
- Over 4,000 community members participated in <u>Parks volunteer events</u>, planting 54,000 native plants including 8,800 trees through the <u>Green Seattle</u> <u>Partnership</u>.
